

POSSE CORNERS BANK THIEVES

Census Figures Show
City Now Has 7,801
Residents Within Borders

News is Most Pleasing—Estimate is Made That 25,000 Reside Within Five Miles

ZEPPELIN
ALL READY
FOR LAST HOP

Refueled and Provisioned for Transatlantic Flight, Big Gasbag Leaves Tonight

Lakehurst, N. J., June 2.—(UPI)—The dirigible Graf Zeppelin stood fueled and ready in the naval air station hangar here today for the final leg of a pioneering commercial flight linking three continents.

Dr. Hugo Eckener, commander, has set 10 o'clock tonight as the hour at which the world's largest airship will depart for its base, Friedrichshafen, Germany, to end the 12,000-mile voyage which started two weeks ago yesterday and took the dirigible over the South Atlantic to Brazil, then northward to the United States.

Reports received this morning from Washington, D. C., relative to the population figures for Kittanning as shown by the recent census are most pleasing. The figures show that Kittanning during the past ten years has enjoyed a 5.1% growth and that the new population figures for the town are 7,801 as against 7,153 shown ten years ago.

The figures for the various sections of the city are shown as follows:

These figures of course are preliminary and subject to correction.

Another interesting phase is that in the Fourth Ward of Kittanning where unemployment might be expected to be shown as greater than in some other wards there were only 34 men out of steady employment and looking for work when the census figures were taken.

With the population of Kittanning showing this interesting increase it is a safe computation to figure that there are 25,000 persons within a five-mile radius of the Court House. This is a large trading circle from which business is drawn to Kittanning and in this area the circulation of "The Leader" is heavy.

SIX DIE
IN CHICAGO
GANG WARWave of Assassination
Starting Saturday Engulfs
Gangland Over Weekend

Chicago, June 2.—(UPI)—Two more deaths today brought by the week-ending war toll in Greater Chicago to six. Four others were wounded, two of whom were believed dying.

The latest victim of gang guns, a man about 35, was found today in an alley in the northwest side. He had been shot four times and hit on the head. The body apparently had been tossed from a motor car. Police were unable to identify him from fingerprints and expressed the belief that he was a minor hoodlum.

The wave of gang murders started Saturday with the assassination of Philip Gonic, alcohol racketeer.

Three of the dead were murdered early yesterday in a Fox Lake, Ill., roadside by a burst of machine gun fire from the darkness. The two wounded, one of them a woman, Mrs. Vivian McGinnis, were brought to Chicago and dumped into the lobby of the University Hospital where they are near death.

"Moonshine Sam" Minsterio, who was shot with two others in Washington Square, where hobos and malcontents gather, died today in Calumet Hospital from his wounds.

The roadhouse murders, police said, marked the start of a battle between the Al Capone gang and the Al Capone group to control the lucrative beer trade to adjoining summer resorts.

Zeppelins officers and members of the crew took advantage of the stopover to obtain rest.

Local police have reported no progress in the attempt to run down the safe crackers that played havoc with the funds of the Peerless Laundry and several other local business firms Wednesday night.
